Yorktown, Texas, Holy **Cross Parish**

Excerpts taken from "A History of Holy Cross Catholic Church, Yorktown, Texas" composed by Lillian Tam Warzecha, September 2000 at age 87 – Summarized and updated by Martha Respondek 2016 and condensed by Bishop Yanta

Holy Cross Catholic Church was originally a mission of Meyersville and Panna Maria in 1866, some 150 years ago. The Civil War had just come to an end in 1865.

The first parishioners that came from Meyersville as well as from Panna Maria originally were Polish families who came from villages in Upper Silesia, then under German/Prussian rule. These early settlers arrived in Texas between 1854 and 1856 – they left Silesia in September 1854 and made the nine-week voyage across the Atlantic Ocean, landing in Galveston on December 3, 1854. Then they traveled to Indianola where

they secured the services of local Mexicans and their ox carts to transport them to San Antonio. Their belongings rode in ox carts, while the men, women and children walked most of the way. With help of Father Leopold Moczygemba, they secured lands and some settled in Karnes County, some in Panna Maria, and some turned toward Meyersville.

Because of a severe drought in 1856 lasting fourteen months, also continuous harassment by cowboys in Karnes County, and the discontent with the German language used in services in Meyersville, several families moved to the small but growing community of Yorktown. These families had learned about the Polish settlement in Yorktown from the Polish priests who rode horseback to Yorktown from Panna Maria in order to minister to the Catholics. Masses were held for the early settlers by these visiting priests at the Anton Kozielski log home which was built in 1862 which was not too far from the present Holy Cross Church.

Priests Serving Yorktown

Parish Development 1867-1915

On February 1, 1867, Anton Kozielski and his wife, Lucyia, deeded three acres of land to the Catholic Church to be used in building a church. Father John

Frydychowitz, a Resurrectionist priest, arrived in Yorktown sometime before Easter 1868 and started the campaign to build the new church.

In September 1868, the people completed a small wooden church with two towers. On September 14, 1868 the new church was blessed by Bishop Claude Dubois of the San Antonio Diocese. It was blessed under the patronage of the Immaculate Conception and therefore named St. Mary's.

In 1867, there were 17 Polish households in Yorktown, and then 30 years later in 1897, Father Thomas Moczygemba came to pastor St. Mary's and found 100 Polish families in his congregation, along with 35 Bohemian families and a few German families.

On August 11, 1897 Isidore Kozielski, son of Anton and Lucyia, deeded sixty-seven hundredths of an acre for the church to have a cemetery. Again on February 23, 1898 he deeded one more acre of land for the rest of the Catholic cemetery.

On May 1886, a hurricane damaged the church. It was through the efforts of a parishioner, Kaspar "Jessie" Kasprzik (Lillian Warzecha's great-grandfather, Martha Respondek's great-grandfather, and the great-grandfather of Bishop Yanta) who collected a large amount of donations which financed the church expansion. The church which was previously 40 feet long was now 90 feet long. This was recorded by August Styra in 1900.

In 1901 another addition to the church was made as well as a new altar, new vestments, and new statues. And – a new rectory was built for living quarters for the priest – all done under the pastorate of Monsignor Thomas Moczygemba. By 1909, 160 families belonged to St. Mary's.

Present Church

On April 7, 1915 Yorktown's St. Mary's Catholic Church burned to the ground. Father John Jachtyl desperately tried to reach the tabernacle to remove the Sacred Hosts but was unable to do so because of the intense heat. Fortunately he was able

to save the monstrance and a few vestments. Miraculously, the cross atop the steeple survived the fire.

Under Father Jachtyl's guidance, the new brick church was built for \$28,000.00. The furnishings cost \$20,000.00. Parish families donated the beautiful stained glass windows of various saints which cost \$100.00 each. Many were donated in memory of loved ones and inscripted in Polish. Beautiful Stations of the Cross with sculpted detail and vivid colors and also inscripted in Polish were hung on the walls between the stained glass windows. The ornate main altar with the breathtaking sculpted picture of the Last Supper was donated by Edmund and Barbara Kasprzik Respondek. The larger Angelus bell weighing 1100 pounds was donated by Frank Gaida Sr. and Edmund Respondek. The second bell weighing 800 pounds was donated by the St. Joseph's Men's Society, and the third and smallest bell was donated by Francisek Kolodzie. Anton Tam Sr. is remembered to have helped place the cross on the steeple.

Members of the building committee were F. J. Kolodzie, Stefan Ledwig, Frank Kolodziejczyk, Frank Gaida Sr., A.R. Dworaczyk, and Joseph Broll.

The cornerstone was blessed on the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on September 14, 1915 by Bishop John Shaw of the San Antonio Diocese. The Pope at this time was Benedict XV. The architect was F.B. Gaenslen and the contractor was Falbo Bros. of San Antonio.

Bishop Shaw blessed the new Holy Cross Catholic Church on May 19, 1916. The surviving cross is now atop our present church.

Building of Rectory, Sisters' home, and School

In 1926 the present Holy Cross rectory and the Sisters' house was built for \$12,000, under the guidance of Father Peter Grzesiak, pastor.

Father Grzesiak died on March 16, 1932 at the age of 51 and was the first priest to be buried in the parish cemetery.

Father Ben Kaminski was appointed pastor on January 11, 1937. The first years after his arrival were devoted to bringing financial order back to the parish. The Great Depression years had led to financial and physical hardship on so many and, too, the church itself was in dire need of funds. During his pastorate the cemetery was enlarged and the new Holy Cross School was dedicated on September 21, 1947.

Father Kaminski remained at Holy Cross until 1969, after 32 years of service to Yorktown when he retired and settled in Victoria. Father Kaminski died May 1, 1974 and is buried at Holy Cross Cemetery.

Later changes and renovations

In 1962 – Pope John XXIII opened the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council on October 11, 1962 and adjourned under Pope Paul VI on December 7, 1965. This brought about many changes in the Catholic Church. Among them was the decision to have Mass celebrated with the priest facing the congregation. Some people of the parish believed the main altar should be removed and replaced by a smaller one. But Father Kaminski and a large majority of the parishioners wanted to preserve the beautiful altar, including Lambert Respondek, whose parents, Edmund and Barbara Respondek donated the altar when Holy Cross was built in 1915.

August (Doc) Kozielski and Paul Stepanski, who were skilled carpenters, had a good idea on how the altar could be saved. As a result, they carefully cut away the front part of the altar with the replica of the Last Supper, and moved it a few feet forward and a new altar built around it. The larger original altar was filled in where the Last Supper replica was and blended it in with the decor.

The crucifixion monument made from different types of marbles was constructed at the cemetery making Holy Cross Cemetery one of the most beautiful in Texas. It was donated by Frank and Florentyna Jendrzey.

In 1976 Holy Cross Church was renovated during the pastorate of Father Edward Bartsch at a cost of \$55,650.00.

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In 2010 and 2011, another renovation of the interior of the church occurred under the pastorate of Father Roger Hawes –current Shepherd of the Holy Cross flock.

On Sunday, September 13, 2015, the Holy Cross Catholic Church celebrated its 100th centennial anniversary. A centennial Mass was celebrated with the Most Reverend Bishop Brendan J. Cahill and Reverend Roger Hawes officiating.

St. Mary's Parochial School 1897-1947 Holy Cross Parochial School 1947-1969

In 1894 Father Thomas Moczygemba made application to the Incarnate Word Convent for good parochial school teachers.

In 1947 land in back of the old school was purchased and then the old school was torn down. An efficient functional brick building was constructed under the pastorate of Reverend Ben Kaminski who chose to serve as general contractor and supervisor saving the parish thousands of dollars.

The Felician Sisters taught at the schools of St. Mary's and Holy Cross for a combined thirty-four years from 1935 until its closing in 1969.

After the school closed, the Felician Sisters from Yorktown Memorial Hospital taught religious education, assisted by lay people.

During the pastorate of Father Casey Jarzombek, the school building was converted into an Activity Center for the parishioners and as a center for the Religious Education program.

Holy Cross Parish today – 2016

Holy Cross Parish now has a very diverse ethnicity – some 225 families of many different ethnic backgrounds all come together to honor and praise God – and we sing in English, Polish, and Spanish. Holy Cross parishioners all cherish the Polish beginnings of our beautiful church. We celebrate the anniversary of our




of Poland includes this famous site. He is more widely known by the Spanish version of his name: San Jacinto! *Donor Filip & Tekla Kasprzik Tam, Frank & Mary Dlugosch Tam, Anton & Annie Styra Tam, Tom Tam.*



Bottom left and bottom right are the stained glass windows of the brothers Sts. Cyril & Methodius, the Apostles of the Slavs. It was through their tireless missionary effort that the Gospel was brought to the Slavic peoples. As a result of their work in Bohemia, when the Christian Princess Dobrawa was wedded to the Polish king Mieszko, not only did Mieszko become a Catholic Christian, so did all of Poland in 966! This year 2016 is the 1050 year anniversary of Poland becoming a Catholic nation.


