Selected Views of Exhibits, Entry Lobby:

Visitors enter the lobby space and are greeted by a colorful mural as seen on page 1, measuring 30' x 11.' The mural is

a sweeping tableau depicting the arrival of the first Polish immigrants from the Silesian region to Texas in 1854 and illustrating their first churches, schools, marriages, Baptisms, First Communions — hard working men and women and families building their lives in Texas through the decades. At the center of the mural, Our Lady of Czestochowa is surrounded by Saint John Paul II, Saint Stanislaus, Saint Hyacinth and Saint Hedwig. The saints represent the immigrants' deep and abiding faith and a continuity with their homeland. The mural concludes on the right depicting descendants of those early pioneers returning to their Polish Silesian homeland to reconnect with their history.

To the left, visitors see a Family Prayer, recognizing the importance of faith and family. Flanking the prayer are eight small, programmable, video monitors, displaying welcoming messages, images of pioneers, families, and events.

To the right side of the lobby, a large multiscreen video display provides visitors with a view of the villages that the original settlers emigrated from and the parishes they first settled in Texas.


To their direct front, and flanking the opening leading to the rotunda, visitor attention is drawn to five large, elegant, artistically lighted, etched glass panels. The names of the Center's generous donors are proudly displayed on these panels along with those they chose to remember and the exhibits they have sponsored.

Visitors now transition into the rotunda and approach the beautiful painted icons of Saints Cyril and Methodius, standing together on a lighted pedestal.



What a marvelous sight! But there is still a lot of work to do before the Polish Heritage Center opens. Many see this beautiful building and are asking when will it be opened? In short, we are about half way finished. Right now, it is VERY important that we continue the Capital Campaign; it is a MUST! At the beginning of the building project, we looked at what we had and what was pledged and saw that it was enough to begin our Heritage Center. In other words, to build the building. We are now focused on the continued need of being able to move the project forward. We are building the office and administrative spaces on the south side of the building overlooking the beautiful San Antonio River valley.

If all stays on track with the Capital Campaign fundraising, it is "**possible**" for the Polish Heritage Center to open in late 2019! This lead time is also needed because although the images of the interior exhibits have been finalized, they still need to be made, and that takes time. Everything in the Polish Heritage Center will be custom made. The plan is to do Phase III in stages. The first stage is to build out the offices and meeting room so that we can have an actual presence in the building. In other words, we will have a base of operations. Then, we will proceed by completing the interior, having the many exhibits installed, and then open so that we may showcase our ancestors and their faith, God willing!



The plan is to build out the area shaded in blue. This is the administrative and office area of the Polish Heritage Center. It consists of the Conference Room, three offices, restroom, computer room, Library-Archive room, and the connecting hallway. *There will be an elevator near the west entrance which will be enclosed for now and will be added at a later date.* This will then allow us to remove the *budka* (the nickname given to the red building that had been serving as our field office, the word means *shed* or *small building* in Polish) and become a functioning office. We will be able to have our Campaign Steering Committee, Solicitors Committee, Board of Directors, and many other support activities meetings! Our plan is to have the office staffed so that when you or visitors come by, we will be able to present the most up -to-date report on the progress of the Heritage Center and showcase the near future plans as well. It is exciting that soon we will have a presence in our Center to better be able to show it off!

What Are We – Museum or Heritage Center?

What is a Cultural/Heritage Center and how does it compare to a Traditional Museum?

A Museum is typically an institution devoted to acquiring, preserving, caring for, and organizing objects, groups of objects, or artifacts of lasting interest and importance for display.

A Cultural or Heritage Center can take many forms and may resemble a museum in that it may collect and display objects of lasting interest. *However*, the Cultural or Heritage Center typically dedicates itself to informing and educating visitors about a particular group of people, their customs, beliefs, traditions, material traits, and religious and social forms. In many instances the customary or traditional process used by these groups for handing down patterns of thought, action, beliefs, and customs has been by word of mouth or by example without written instructions.

Many Cultural or Heritage Centers have been established to inform and educate visitors about the refinement of intellectual and artistic taste or cultural beliefs of groups that no longer exists. These groups may have been destroyed, scattered or adsorbed into a larger, more diverse social landscape or so diluted through social integration that they no longer retain their cultural identity.

The goal and the challenge for the Polish Heritage Center is to inform and educate visitors and retain for posterity customs, beliefs, and traditions of the first permanent Polish Silesian settlers in America and their descendants. The further goal is to keep Polish Silesian customs, beliefs, and values vibrant and relevant in today's constantly changing cultural milieu.



Kiolbassa has operated out of its Brazos Street headquarters since 1949 when **Michael Kiolbassa's** grandparents, **Rufus and Juanita Kiolbassa**, founded the Kiolbassa Provision Co. When **Rufus** died at age 45, their son **Robert** — **Michael's** father — took over leadership of the business. **Michael**, shown above, joined the company in 1987.

A few years ago, San Antonio-based Kiolbassa Smoked Meats was growing — on its way to selling its smoked sausage, bacon and chorizo products in all 50 states. I make a people list every day rather than a task list. These are people I want to connect with and talk to whether they're customers or team members or suppliers.

Bishop's corner

Praise Be Jesus Christ!

This newsletter is very important because we are now dedicating our attention to the beautiful interior of our Polish Heritage Center. The exhibits tell the story from the very beginning of our faith and Polish culture in 966 A.D. Jesus said *Go and make disciples of all the nations (Mt 28:19).* St. Patrick gets credit for the conversion of the Irish people. Our Mexican brothers and sisters became Catholic in 1531 after Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared to St. Juan Diego in Mexico City. How did we become Christians? It began with Saints Cyril and Methodius, Greek brothers who evangelized the Slavic peoples. In 966 A.D., Prince Mieszko of Poland married the Czech Princess Dobrawa, a strong Catholic. With that he became a Catholic, and also the rest of Poland became Catholic.
