MONSIGNOR CASIMIR JARZOMBEK


BAY CITY, TEXAS - Monsignor Casimir Jarzombek, 85, of Bay City passed away on Friday, February 15, 2019. He was born August 15, 1933 in Falls City, Texas to the late Thomas Jarzombek and Elizabeth "Lizzie" Wollny Jarzombek. He was baptized on August 17, 1933 and given the name James Leo. He is preceded in death by his sister, Florence Jarzombek Dugi, and brother-in-law, Frank Dugi. Visitation will begin at 5:30 PM and A Vigil and Rosary to begin at 6:30 PM on Monday, February 18, 2019 at Holy Cross Catholic Church in Bay City. A Memorial Mass will be at 10 AM Tuesday, February 19, 2019 at Holy Cross Catholic Church with Bishop David Fellhauer, celebrant and Bishop Brendan Cahill, concelebrant. The Funeral Mass will be at 11:00 AM Wednesday, February 20, 2019 at Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Falls City, Texas, with Bishop Brendan Cahill, celebrant. Interment will follow at the Holy Trinity Catholic Church Cemetery.

He attended Holy Trinity Catholic School during his elementary grades. He desired to become a priest beginning in the fifth grade. His pastor, **Father Theo Janysek**, was his inspiration and gave him much encouragement. In 1948, his ninth grade year, he entered St. John's Minor Seminary in San Antonio. In the fall of 1953 he decided to pursue and was accepted by the Benedictine Order in Corpus Christi. He entered the Subiaco Abbey in Arkansas where he began his formation for the Benedictine Order. He made his first profession of religious vows and took the name of *Casimir*. During the occasional volleyball game, at the Abbey, the monks would call him "Casey." This name would be his for the remainder of his life. On May 26th, 1960 he was ordained to the priesthood at St. Theresa's Catholic Church in Corpus Christi, Texas by **Bishop Mariano Garriga**.

From 1961-1969 He was involved in education either as a teacher or a student. He was sent to the University of Dayton in Ohio to attend a government-sponsored Spanish Language course taught by professors from Spain, Argentina, Chile, Colombia and other countries. This was, in **Monsignor Casey's** own words, "very interesting to say the least." He left the Benedictine Order in 1970. He went

to the Diocese of Pueblo in Colorado. He served two parishes, along with serving in the campus ministry at Adams State College in Alamosa, Colorado.

In 1974, Father Theo Janysek, who was Father Casev's of inspiration true source encouragement, strongly urged him to return to the Diocese of San Antonio. He met with **Archbishop Furey** in San Antonio and was accepted as a priest in the Archdiocese of San Antonio. He was assigned as Associate Pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Victoria, Texas. He also worked with the youth and served in campus ministry at Victoria College and the University of Houston Victoria Campus. In 1976 he was incardinated in the Archdiocese of San Antonio as a diocesan priest. He became involved with World Wide Marriage Encounter in 1979. He presented many



Marriage Encounter weekends in Victoria and many different cities throughout Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Georgia. He continued his involvement until last year, when he became ill. He loved every aspect of his work with Marriage Encounter, he loved the couples he served, his brotherhood of Marriage Encounter priests and the many friends that worked side by side with him. Other parishes that he served at were, Holy Cross Catholic Church, Yorktown and its two mission churches San Luis in Yorktown and St. Ann's in Nordheim, St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Palacios, Texas. In 1998 he was assigned to Holy Cross Parish in Bay City, Texas. Where he served as Pastor until his retirement in 2012 and he remained there until his death.

Monsignor Casey was a member of the Bay City Knights of Columbus, Council 3070, he attained a Fourth Degree with the El Campo Assembly 1231. He was very involved in the A.C.T.S. movement and Life Teen at Holy Cross parish. He was instrumental in beginning Perpetual Adoration at Holy Cross as a shared worship with Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish. His love for Holy Cross Catholic School, the students, and teachers brought such joy to his heart. He will be remembered for his quick wit, phenomenal sense of humor, captivating smile, a welcoming confessor, and loving soul. He is survived by a plethora of friends who loved him dearly. We now celebrate the beauty and blessing of his life that we were fortunate to share. In lieu of flowers, donations can be made to the Education of Seminarians of the Diocese of Victoria.

Reflections on Fr. Casey Jarzombek by Fr. Jacob Koether

Come Holy Spirit fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love; send forth your Spirit and they shall be created and you shall renew the face of the earth.

There was a priest somewhere up north who was finishing up his last Mass after a long Ash Wednesday. He locked up the church, got the lights, and wrapped himself up in his coat before making the short walk to his rectory which was just around the corner. It was going to be a brisk one on this cold Lenten evening. But as he turned the corner, a man stepped out of the shadows, pointed a gun at him, and told him to hand over all the money he had. Shocked and afraid, the priest opened up his coat to grab his wallet. But when the man saw his black clothes and white collar and realized that he was about to rob a priest, he apologized and said, "Oh I'm sorry Father, I didn't realize you were a priest. Put your wallet back." Relieved the priest reached into his other pocket to pull out some cigars to share with the man as a token of gratitude. But the man respectfully declined, "No thank you Father, I gave those up for Lent."

That was one of my favorite Fr. Casey jokes. He always had lots of them. Actually, he had a whole folder full of them. But most of his jokes he had stored away in his memory which he was always able to quickly draw from in any situation to lighten it up and make us laugh. That's probably one of the things I'll remember the most about Fr. Casey, I think - his joy. It radiated from him - a peaceful and warm happiness that was infectious.

You could tell that he loved his life. He loved the people he served, he loved the Church, and he loved his priesthood. He gave such a beautiful example of joyful living. And it's a big reason why I'm a priest now. I was an altar boy here growing up and had the chance to be around Fr. Casey and this altar quite a bit. He would encourage me pretty regularly to consider the priesthood. But he would do it in his own way - "So you know I'm going to retire one day. I'm going to need someone to take my place. Are you going to take my place? You going to take my spot after I retire?" His joy made it a lot easier to seriously consider priesthood, especially because of where He found that joy.

Of course, he was imperfect and a sinner like the rest of us and he didn't do priesthood perfectly. But Fr. Casey sure was consistent in fighting to stay centered on the Lord, particularly in the Blessed Sacrament. In the time that Fr. Casey spent in the adoration chapel or here in the sanctuary, the way that he held up the host at the consecration at Mass, he didn't leave you any doubt that he believed with his whole strength that this is God.

I remember him saying that whenever life as a priest would get hard or he got lonely, he would come into the church at night, kneel down as close he could to Jesus, and pray in silence with his hands resting on the tabernacle. Coupled with his love of Our Lady as well as his devotion to Scripture and the Liturgy of the Hours, Fr. Casey worked to build his life on God.

He understood and tried to live what the Lord reminds us today in the Gospel. Jesus says, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." And that in Him, we have a home prepared for us with the Father in heaven. There is nothing of this world that can take us to that place, nothing that can bring us the joy and satisfaction that we all desire - only Jesus. He's the one who claims us as His own, calls us from sin, saves us from death, and invites us into a life of supernatural love and goodness.

A couple days before Fr. Casey was called to that home, I had the privilege of preparing him for it through the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and some of the final prayers the Church has for those on their deathbed. It was an incredible gift to be there in that moment and to ready this holy man for the place he had been preparing for and working to get others to his whole life. For me, it had come full circle as I thought of that question he asked me again and again when I was growing up - "You going to take my place?" Yes. I gladly will, hopefully with as much joy and fidelity as you have.

When I was in that hospital room, I could tell that he was getting close to the end. His sharp mind and quick wit had dulled and slowed, things were foggy for him, his speech was confused, and we repeated prayers until he remembered where we were. But at the end of the prayers, I asked if he was ready to see Jesus. And in an amazingly flash of lucidity, Fr. Casey responded, "I am ready for whatever the Lord wants for me." It was pretty much the last thing he said to me. What a beautiful end to a beautiful life.


Today we offer up that life to our heavenly Father in gratitude for all he did for us and the Church in drawing us closer to that home we were made for. We also pray asking God for forgiveness for Fr. Casey, that should any sin have stained him or any fault affected him, that it would by the Lord's loving mercy be forgiven and wiped away. Lastly, we pray for ourselves and we ask that we be prepared when we reach the end of our earthly lives. May we build our lives on God, may we follow Jesus the way, the truth, and the life who leads us to the Father in heaven.

And so we pray: eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord. And let perpetual light shine upon him. May his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen.

Both were only a few years apart at St. John's Seminary, where they got to know each other well, and later had occasion to work together over the years. Bishop Yanta attended Msgr. Jarzombek's funeral Mass and burial at Holy Trinity Church in Falls City which was presided over by Bishop Brenden Cahill, Bishop of the Diocese of Victoria, Texas.

During the reception following in the hall at Holy Trinity Church, there was much remembering and reminiscing over the beautiful life that **Fr. Casey** led. On pages 2 and 3 is the obituary that appeared in the *Victoria Advocate* newspaper. In it, you are able to glimpse a sense of the rich and full life that **Fr. Casey** not only experienced but also shared with others.

Msgr. Jarzombek, like Bishop Yanta, also saw the importance of celebrating and saving our heritage. Last year, on what is believed was his last visit to his *home area*, **Msgr. Jarzombek**, who wanted to help support the Polish Heritage Center, brought with him and donated a box of items for our collection. In it were books, crucifix, and the like. Like **Bishop Yanta**, **Fr. Casey** perceived the need to celebrate and save our heritage.


Laura Krawietz Dylla, of Adkins, Texas

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CONSTRUCTION UPDATES AND PICS



Construction continues to press forward! In this current phase, III-C, work is ongoing primarily in the Concession area and Restrooms. The main floor in the Concession area is laid and the protective covering over them has just been removed. The floor for the Restrooms is poured, polished, and finished. Our Septic system outside has been installed. A 1000 gallon auxiliary water tank in the sub-level is in place. Once the remaining Restrooms fixtures are in, the Restrooms should become operational! The ceiling tiles in the Concession area are up and the final coat of paint has been applied. All that is left is the later installation of a showcase that will display what will be for sale and the installation of vending machines for snacks and drinks.

Although we are "not" open yet, there are two different ways to visit:

Upon my recent visit and inspection of the Polish Heritage Center on August 3rd, I wish to thank all of you who have supported this legacy to our ancestors. Without you, this beautiful project is not possible. Currently we are busy working inside where it is difficult to see the progress. Phase III-C, the construction of the restrooms and concession area are nearly completed at a cost of \$474,026. The next phase III-D will focus on the landscaping and curbing, as well as some inside work and is expected to cost about \$331,601. This phase should be finished towards late September. Phase III-A, the Admin office spaces was completed earlier this year at a cost of \$424,572. And in Phase III-B, the installation of the metal studs cost \$400,851.
