We then celebrated, with joy, the 90th birthday of Bishop John W. Yanta at the St. Paul's Community Center in San Antonio. This event was fun and exciting with music and many paying tribute and giving thanks to Bishop John W. Yanta for his life-long service and contributions. There were many extended birthday wishes including the singing of Happy Birthday, Sto Lat and many other beautiful Polish songs presented by the Seraphic sisters. We were again blessed the with presence of Archbishop Gustavo Garcia-Siller and Auxiliary Bishop Mike Boulette. It was indeed, a wonderful and fun evening.

In July, we began a fundraising campaign to complete our \$14M capital campaign which includes startup operating funds. The fundraising campaign included Bishop's birthday celebration and the continued opportunity to move up in society recognition with donations received through December 31, 2021. 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Inspiration in the Library!

The Polish Heritage Center in Panna Maria will offer a library containing a myriad of books as well as a space for research and instruction. The space will offer to everyone a trove of locally focused materials such as books and artifacts covering a wide array of Polish history, culture, religion, economics, and even cookbooks. Ranging from the founding of Poland, the center's books trace Polish immigration

and the impact of Polish culture on American communities such as Panna Maria. There will be a wide scope of research topics including politics, wars, religion, and culture. The library will also boast a technology station composed of computers for visitors to conduct additional research. The library will also serve as a site where patrons can have access to archival materials. As the site of the center's educational and instructional center, guests will have access to a plethora of sources and materials not just limited to books, but also can interact with different artifacts such as photographs from the local Polish community in Panna Maria. Even though materials will not be allowed to leave the library, we plan on having a copier and scanning station where guests can make their own physical copies or scan into a PDF to email in order to have copies for themselves. As a site not just designated for Panna Maria, the library will serve all those interested in learning more about the Polish impact on Texas history and the settlements that were founded. Even those not from Texas will have the chance to learn about Polish history and its influence found in the rest of the United States, as we have books focusing on Polish immigration and its impact in places such as Chicago, Illinois.

The library is still a work in progress, but we have obtained several interesting books in both English, Polish, and Spanish. Some of the books that have been graciously donated focus on Polish religion, history, culture, World War II, and famous Polish peoples throughout history. Some specific examples of books obtained that demonstrate the wide scope of the center include Joanna Wojdon's White and Red Umbrella: The Polish American Congress in the Cold War Era, 1944-1988, Adam Zamoyski's The Polish Way: A Thousand-Year History of the Poles and their Culture, Kenneth K. Koskodan's No Greater Ally: The Untold Story of Poland's Forces in World War II, and Reverend Edward J. Dworaczyk's The Centennial History of Panna Maria, Texas 1854-1954. These are just examples of the types of resources we have documenting and teaching the different ways in

which Polish history has helped influence not just Poland and Panna Maria, but the world. While we only have a fraction of the books on site, we are excited at the sources we have already acquired and eager to see the rest!

The main aim of the library is to offer all types of information regarding Polish heritage to its patrons, regardless of reading for research or pleasure. Another great aspect of the library are records pertaining to the names of

Polish immigrants, allowing visitors to track their genealogy. A goal of the center is to be able to aid members of the Polish community in genealogical research. Working with researchers and friends of the center, we will have a database filled with family names and history dating back to the 1850s. Records include but are not limited to ship manifests documenting immigration from Poland to the states, birth certificates, wedding licenses, and even land records. With the help of our patrons, we hope to continue to add onto this amazing project. With such a wide range of topics, our mission is to become an ongoing site of research and instruction, providing information and education of the rich history of Panna Maria and

the Polish communities through 2D and 3D objects, primary, and secondary literature. We are going to strive to provide valuable information and knowledge to be inclusive of everyone that is eager to learn more about Polish history.

Here at the Polish Heritage Center, we are working very hard planning and finalizing details for our grand opening to the public. Some of the processes we are currently working on is our collections committee and policies that will allow us to

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Brother Emil John Pawelek, S.M. 1909 – 2001

Emil John Pawelek was born in rural Wadsworth, Matagorda County, Texas, on October 19, 1909. He was the son of **Charles Pawelek** and **Florence Pollok**. Both families



originated from Upper Silesia, present-day Poland. His mother's family, the Polloks, arrived on the *Weser* in Galveston, Texas, on December 3, 1854. They were Emil's great-grandparents, **Caspar Pollok** and **Margaretha Pierdola**, from Grodzisko, Upper Silesia. His father's family, the Paweleks, arrived on the *Saxonia* in New Orleans, Louisiana, on October 23, 1868. They were Emil's paternal grandparents, **Maciej Pawelek** and **Josepha Kossak**.

When Emil was a child, his family moved to Falls City, Texas, and became members of Holy Trinity parish. When he was 14 years old, Emil received the sacrament of Confirmation by **Bishop Arthur J. Drossaerts** on October 30, 1923, and his sponsor was **H.A. Gabrysch**. Confirmation names selected by the children were not included in the Holy Trinity Catholic Church list (unpaged; digital image 135). Emil attended school in Poth and Falls City before becoming a student for four years in the preparatory department of St. Louis College which is now St. Mary's University in San Antonio. In the fall of 1932, he left Texas for Kirkwood, Missouri, to enter the postulate at Maryhurst followed by the novitiate in 1933. He explained his vocational choice, "I was out in the world for quite a few years, and I found out that the world was too distracting."

Brother Emil professed his first vows on January 22, 1934, and five years later, on July 15, 1939, he made his final profession of vows as a Marianist Brother. He inherited his parents' love for tilling the soil and preferred working

outdoors; his superiors honored his wishes and assigned him to places where he could tend to trees, farm the land, and sometimes serve as a maintenance man. According to the Marianist Archives, during the early years of his assignment at St. Mary's University, "Brother Emil raised cattle and hens in what later became the baseball diamond."



From 1941 through 1989, Brother Emil's working assignments fluctuated among Maryhurst in Kirkwood, Missouri; St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas; Chaminade College Preparatory School in St. Louis, Missouri; and Nolan High School in Fort Worth, Texas. He was a gardener and arborist with a specialty in pecan trees: "Many of the pecan trees planted on the campus of St. Mary's University owe their origin to Brother's tender loving care" (*San Antonio Express-News*, February 20, 2001, page 6B).

After **Brother Emil** suffered a stroke in 1989, he retired to the St. Joseph's Community in the Marianist Residence in San Antonio "... where he continued his characteristic quiet presence among his fellow brothers. Even in his retirement he kept his beloved gardening tools nearby as a witness to his many years of service" (Marianist Archives, February 17, 2001).

On February 17, 2001, **Brother Emil Pawelek**, SM, died in San Antonio, Texas, at the age of 91. His Rosary was held in the Chapel of the Marianist Residence on Monday evening, February 19th, and his Mass of the Resurrection was celebrated at 4 PM on Tuesday, February 20th. **Bishop John W. Yanta** was the principal celebrant and gave the homily recognizing Brother Emil's lifetime of dedicated service. Bishop Yanta's mother, **Mary Magdalene Pollok Yanta**, was a first cousin of **Brother Emil**. **Bishop Yanta** recalled that **Brother Emil** always had a broad smile on his face and was well-liked by his fellow workers. After serving as a Marianist Brother for 68 years, **Brother Emil Pawelek**, SM, was laid to rest in the Marianist Cemetery on the campus of St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas.
