Panna Maria is the oldest permanent Polish settlement in America, but Poles have been in America long before our nationhood. Dr. Raymond Glembocki, President of the American Council on Polish Culture, was featured on May 31 with an excellent presentation about the Poles in Jamestown in 1608.

| Sobieski and the Winged Hussars

A gentleman from Minnesota was going through the PHC donor galleries recently when he came across the King Jan Sobieski Society. "Hey, Sobieski is the name of my hometown! Who was he?" he asked. So I took him to the exhibit featuring the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth where he learned a lot more than he had known about this Polish king and his military exploits.

Jan III Sobieski ruled as the King of Poland and Grand Duke of Lithuania from 1674 until his death in 1696. He spent much of his military career fighting the ceaseless forays of the Ottoman Empire of Turkey against the Christian Commonwealth.

Sobieski's defining battle occurred in September, 1683, following a two-month siege of Vienna. He led a force of 100,000 soldiers, primarily Poles, Austrians, and Germans, against a force of 150,000 Ottoman Turks commanded by the Grand Vizier Mustafa.


The Battle of Vienna featured the largest known calvary charge in history, with 18,000 Christian calvary galloping down the hillsides, led by 3000 Polish hussars. The hussars were elite mounted fighters, remembered in

military lore as the "winged hussars" because of their unusual large wooden wings decorated with raptor feathers.

Polish historian Jędrzej Kitowicz (1728-1804) described these fighters: "...the husaria men wore wooden arcs attached to their armour at the back and raising over their heads. These arcs, together with bristling feathers sticking out of them, were dyed in various colours in imitation of laurel branches or palm leaves and were a strangely beautiful sight to behold."

The wings in motion also made a loud rattling noise, which altogether was intended to demoralize the enemy during the charge. It worked brilliantly, and the smaller yet superior force routed the Turks. It is widely argued that the victory at Vienna, led by King Sobieski, saved Western civilization.

Much of the information you have just read comes courtesy of the stanchion text found next to the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth exhibit in the Polish Heritage Center. We always encourage our visitors to read the text or listen to the information via audio wands. And we always welcome our friends from Sobieski, Minnesota to the PHC in Panna Maria.
